

Autumn, Astronomy, and Meteorology

(continued from page 1) Where does fall occur in September? In the Northern Hemisphere of the Earth, which contains half of the Earth that is north the Equator, Fall began September 22. Fall, also referred to colloquially as Autumn, is one of the 4 seasons each of which contains an astronomical start (September 22) and a meteorological start (September 1). According to The Old Farmer's Almanac, "The astronomical start date is based on the position of the Sun in relation to the Earth. The meteorological start date is based on the 12-month calendar and annual temperature." (Almanac, 2018, para 3).

So now that we know why fall occurs in September, what are characteristics of Fall? Fall is generally characterized with it's cooler weather, leaves turning brown/orange, leaves falling, and fall harvest (pumpkins, cranberries, squash, and sweet potatoes).

How does fall occur in September?

The Earth's rotation on it's axis began on Day 1 with God's establishment of earth as a sphere (Proverbs 8:27, Isaiah 40:22, Iob 26:10) and the establishment of time with 24 hour cycle day according to Genesis 1:1-6. Further, the Earth began to orbit around the Sun on Day 4 after God's creation of the sun according to Genesis 1:14-19. This orbit around the Sun established seasons. Psalm 104:9 says "He made the moon to mark the seasons; the sun knows its time for setting." So when we think about each season God has provided, we can


faithfully attest to His goodness in Creation. The first human to orbit into space, orbit the Earth, and confirm it's spherical shape and rotation through observational science occurred in 1961 with Yuri Gagarin. However, the Old Testament has affirmed these realities for centuries and was written in 1550 to 6th century B.C., thousands of years prior to modern space explorations.

Columbus Day

Similar to Labor Day, Columbus Day's history is complex and has impacted all Americans. Columbus Day is a national holiday which commemorates the anniversary of Italian explorer Christopher Columbus's arrival in the Carribean islands of Bahamas and Turks and Caicos on October 12, 1492. Indigenous Peoples Day

Indigenous People refers to the original or native inhabitants of a specific region. In America, the Indigenous Peoples are often referred to as Native Americans. The patterns of migration suggest that Native Americans arrived in North America postflood, thousands of years prior to Columbus' arrival in the Carribean, during the Ice Age after crossing the Bering Strait from present day East Asia (Russia). In response to growing knowledge on the history of Columbus Day, many U.S. cities and states have changed the day to Indigenous Peoples Day to honor the original inhabitants of American soil.

REFORMATION DAY

October 31 is the anniversary of the day which Martin Luther nailed his 95 Thesis to the door of the All Saints' Church in Wittenburg on October 31, 1517. It was during 1517 that Martin Luther also began <u>communion with the Ethiopian Orthodox Church</u>. Some have speculated whether that pre-empted his changed perspective of Catholic Eurachrist as well as Papal Authority. Martin Luther's <u>95 Thesis</u> further defined the Protestant Reformation and the resultant Protestant Church as we now know it. John Calvin and Huldrych Zwingli, reformed contemporaries of Luther, refined their reformed theological distinctions further as spurred on by Luther's <u>95 Thesis</u>. Martin Luther himself was Catholic in the Augustinian order, a student and practitioner of St. Augustine of Hippo's teachings on Biblical Theology heavily influenced by the Apostle Paul and foremost Jesus Christ our Lord. While Luther posted his <u>95 Thesis</u>, many attribute the father of the Reformation to Augustine.

Historically, the Protestant Reformation challenged Papal authority both ecclesiastically and politically. The Protestant Reformation reinforced the Authority of Scripture espoused in John 14:6 "Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father but through Me."" and the Supremacy of Christ, and Christ alone, to redeem mankind as reflected in Matthew 23:9 "Do not call anyone on earth your father; for One is your Father, He who is in heaven."



SLOW COOKER CHICKEN CURRY
